2020 WATER QUALITY REPORT for the CITY OF GRUNDY CENTER The City of Grundy Center strives to provide you with a safe, dependable supply of drinking water that is in compliance with the guidelines established by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). This report contains important information regarding the water quality in our water system. The City of Grundy Center currently purchases its water through a bulk connection with Iowa Regional Utilities Association (IRUA). The Marshalltown Water Works supplies the water which is pumped from nine deep wells located on the north side of the Iowa River drawing from the Buried Sand and Gravel Aguifer and the Mississippian Aguifer. Our water guality testing shows the following results:

GENERAL INFORMATION

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water posed a health risk. More information about contaminants or potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some obtains its water from the buried sand and gravel of the Buried Sand and Gravel aquifer. The Buried Sand and Gravel aquifer was determined to have low susceptibility to contamination because the characteristics of the aquifer and overlying materials provide natural protection from contaminants at the land surface. The Buried Sand and Gravel wells will have low susceptibility to surface contaminants such as leaking underground storage tanks, contaminated spills, and excess fertilizer application.

Marshalltown Water Works also pumps water from the limestone and dolomite of the Mississippian aquifer. The Mississippian aquifer was determined to be susceptible to contamination because the characteristics of the aquifer and overlying materials provide some protection from contaminants from the land surface. The Mississippian wells will be susceptible to surface contaminants such as leaking underground storage tanks, contaminant spills, and excess fertilizer application. COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS June 1, 2021

A regular session of the Holland City Council was called to order at 7:02 p.m. on Tuesday, June 1, 2021, by Mayor Borchardt. Present: Cox, Schoolman, Hansen (arrived 7:15pm), Venenga (arrived 7:20pm) and Kruse. Absent: none.

Kruse moved and Schoolman seconded the approval of the meeting agenda as written striking item #6. Motion carried three ayes.

Schoolman moved and Cox seconded the consent agenda consisting of approval of the minutes of the special session held Tuesday, May 4, 2021; approval of the May 2021 bills list; approval of the May 2021 financial reports. Motion carried three ayes.

Mayor Borchardt opened the public forum at 7:03p.m. No public comments, public forum closed at 7:04pm.

Mayor Borchardt opened the discussion with Ted & Kim Junker regarding the wind turbine project in the area. Junker explained the current activities surrounding the project with the Grundy County Board of Supervisors. The current moratorium is in place until the Board completes a revision of their current wind turbine ordinance. Borchardt commented that this could potentially cause some encroachment to the City of Holland. No formal action taken

Mayor Borchardt opened discussion on a concrete culvert between David Lennard, 101 Main Street and Heartland Coop, 503 Market. Schoolman explained there is signs of sinking of the culvert visible in Lennard's property. City will need to decide on a remedy for the problem at next meeting, Schoolman asked all to look at it. No further discussion, no action taken.

Cox moved and Hansen seconded action on Resolution 2021-11, a resolution authorizing Mayor Borchardt to sign an agreement with Grundy County Sherriff's Office for law enforcement services for fiscal year 2022. No further discussion, motion carried five aves.

Clerk commented on a resident water shut off; barking dog ordinance addressed in current water bill; fiscal year 2021 ends 06/30/2021; and any lawns needing addressed for mowing. Schoolman moved and Cox sec-

Schoolman moved and Cox seconded action for Mayor Borchardt to fill out necessary documents for a credit card for the City, which all employees will be able to use and the credit limit will be \$2000. Schoolman commented on much less steps when purchasing fuel, office supplies, etc. No further discussion, motion carried five ayes.

Kruse commented that the thirdgrade class attended the City park today and were well behaved and cleaned up after themselves. Schoolman commented that there is a need to install a water shut off valve for the bathrooms at the park. Currently the only shut off is at the ballpark concessions stand. Cox moved and Venenga seconded action to add a shut off at the bathrooms at the shelter house and curb stop to the south. No further discussion. motion carried five aves.

Venenga moved and Kruse seconded adjournment of the meeting at 8:33 pm. Motion carried five ayes. Next regular meeting will be July 6, 2021, at 7:00pm.
