Supervisors discuss potential barrier for courthouse gas line

GRUNDY CENTER- The Grundy County Board of Supervisors discussed adding a barrier to protect the courthouse gas line during Monday morning's meeting but ultimately did not take action.

Concerns were raised that the gas line, which runs east from the south side of the building, could be hit if a vehicle backs in and create major safety problems for the county. Jesse Huisman and Don Kampman of the IT/GIS department suggested adding new barriers.

County Engineer Gary Maurer reported that the secondary roads department has about three weeks of rock hauling left and again addressed the state of the county's gravel roads. He noted that despite the complaints he's received, compared to others—like Buchanan County, where a petition was filed to remove the county engineer—it's been relatively tame.

"Some roads are doing pretty good, and some are in pretty rough shape yet," Maurer said.

County Auditor Rhonda Deters added that the grievances with roads are similar across most of Iowa, and Board Chairman Mark Schildroth pointed to changes in agriculture as a prime driver of wear and tear, from large hog confinements to larger semi truckloads.

"There's just a lot more weight on these roads than there was when they were built," Schildroth said. "It's just the additional weight and the traffic, and then you put in a winter like we just had."

As the 2020 census nears, the county has been tasked with appointing a Complete Count Committee and a census liaison, and after receiving instruction from the board, Deters has already sent out a survey to see if any county employees are interested.

After attending a recent Operation Threshold meeting, Supervisor Barb Smith reported that more than 60 families in Grundy County are utilizing the group's services on a monthly basis.

"Families can't meet basic needs, and families need safe, basic affordable housing. Those are things I hear in our community," Smith said.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the board:

- Approved a low fuel quote from Agvantage FS for 17,000 gallons at a price of \$0.93 per gallon for pre-pay and \$0.98 per gallon for no pre-pay.

- Approved a quote from Blacktop Services for \$232,339.21 for hot mix asphalt.

- Approved a change in the five-year construction program.

- Approved a fireworks permit for Flashing Thunder Fireworks.

Highway 14 closed for culvert replacements in western Grundy County

GRUNDY COUNTY- For the second time in the last four months, one of Grundy County's most well travelled state highways will be shut down as road crews go to work on repairs.

As of July 22, Highway 14 is closed from the 175 intersection seven miles west of Grundy Center all the way south to the Highway 96 turnoff in northern Marshall County, according to the Iowa Department of Transportation. The change will have major ramifications for residents of Conrad, Wellsburg and Grundy Center, especially those who commute to Marshalltown for work.

"I haven't heard anything other than the inconvenience," Conrad Mayor Jeff Martin said. "If people want to come into town, it will be a little longer."

The DOT website estimates that the road will likely be closed until mid-October as crews replace culverts for a grading project and improve ditches. County highway T29, locally known as the Beam

Each year during the Grundy County Fair week, farmers from around the area meet at the fairgrounds and depart for a cruise around the surrounding counties, taking in fun sights at each stop.

For the love of reading

D-NH English teacher receives \$2,000 grant for classroom library

DIKE - The benefits of reading have been proven time and again through research; reading boosts mental stimulation, improves analytical thinking skills, expands vocabulary, improves memory and so much more.
For D-NH High School language arts teacher Lauren Petri, reading is an extremely important focus in her teaching, which is why Petri was thrilled to find out she had won a \$2,000 Book Love Foundation Grant that will allow her to purchase new books for her classroom.

Already, Petri has a 500-book library in her classroom that she has filled with books that she’s purchased on her own, books provided by the school and books donated by friends and students.
The library - and the new books Petri will purchase using the grant money - are used not only for classroom learning, but also for leisurely reading options for students.
“In my experience, students are much more likely to invest in a book that I can pull from a shelf at a moment’s notice and recommend to them,” Petri said. “The books vary greatly in topic. I try to make sure my students have access to books they will find relevant to their lives and engaging enough to read outside of the school day.”
One thing Petri focuses on when choosing books for her students is finding literature that brings a new perspective to the students.
“The sophomore curriculum focuses on world literature and understanding perspectives outside of our own, so this grant money will allow me to bring in more perspectives our students aren’t necessarily exposed to in our own community,” she

said. “I will also be filling some of the gaps in my classroom library. I’m always trying to find books our students can connect to and learn from. It’s important that students develop identities as readers and writers, and one way to ensure this happens is giving them lots of choice and time to develop their own preferences.”
And while reading is often thought of as a solitary activity, Petri makes reading a social activity.
“I use the books from my classroom library when we discuss writing techniques; I love pulling out mentor sentences or excerpts to discuss the craft of writing,” she said. “I give students time to read every single day and I talk to them about what I am reading and they are reading as much as I can. I give book talks, bring in other staff to talk about what they are reading, and give students the opportunity to talk about what they are reading with one another. If our students are only reading during school hours, they are not reading enough. I hope for the promotion of reading to be a collective effort from not only our staff, but our community. Our lives are richer when we read, and I believe this for both students and adults.”

With all of the new books that the grant money will help her purchase, Petri is happy to expand her collection of books - though she might run out of space on her shelves soon enough.
“If anyone has a bookshelf or two they are willing to part with, I have a good home for them,” Petri joked.

blacktop, will serve as the official detour.
Grundy County Sheriff Rick Penning reported that his office received three traffic complaints regarding speeding along the detour on the first day, and he plans to increase patrols on T-29. Drivers who attempt to enter the closed road could be subject to doubled fines due to the construction zone as well as a ticket for failure to obey a traffic control device.
“We urge everyone to drive with caution,” he said.
Residents who live on the road will still have local access to the road, as well as those who live on adjacent gravel roads and need to cross. Highway 175 between Grundy Center and Morrison has also been closed since April for a bridge replacement but is expected to reopen by the end of August. Next summer, the DOT will begin work on widening the shoulders and overlay.
Dustin Skogerboe of the DOT’s Marshalltown office said questions about crossing have been the most common inquiries thus far, and he reiterated that crossing is fine as long as drivers don’t turn onto the highway.
“Don’t be driving beyond the barricades,” he said.

Conrad council hears summary of 20-year plan

CONRAD- During the regular meeting on July 11, Iowa State Professor Carlton Basmajian spoke to the Conrad city council about the major recommendations his students have compiled in a 20-year plan for the community.

While he stressed that none of the suggestions are likely to dramatically transform Conrad, they can help to shape its growth and development as leaders look toward the future. According to Basmajian, some of the key issues raised among residents included retail, recreation, housing and quality of life.

"It's a town of around 1,000 (1,108 at the 2010 census), and it's likely to be a town of around 1,000 for a long time," he said.

He also discussed land use goals and zoning codes to ensure that future developments fit into the overall vision of the town.

"You want new development, but you don't necessarily want new development to come in and be at odds with the character of the place," Basmajian said.

The students will complete a visual presentation by the end of the month and return with their findings, and Basmajian recommended bringing residents in to discuss the findings. Conrad has

not had a new comprehensive plan since the 1960s.

"It's your plan, and you guys will decide how you want to adopt it," Basmajian said.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the board:

- Approved a legal services agreement with Dorsey and Whitney for the sanitary sewer UV light project.

- Approved a fund transfer for the fiscal year ending on June 30, 2020.

- Approved revisions to the safety manual and the return to work agreement.

- Approved a Class B native wine permit for Hen and Chicks Studio.

Statewide farmland leasing meetings to give 2020 insight

AMES – Landowners and tenants can improve their knowledge of current leasing issues during the annual statewide farmland leasing meetings, scheduled to begin July 29 in Buchanan, Dallas and Jasper counties.

More than 80 meetings will be held, led by farm management specialists with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach. Each meeting will take the form of a three-hour workshop designed to assist landowners, tenants and other agribusiness professionals with current issues related to farmland ownership, management and leasing arrangements.

The meetings are featured in the July Ag Decision Maker newsletter. Topics will include trends in land values and rental rates, conservation issues, farm bill topics, and a look at the year ahead.

"We've seen an increasing need for farmland owners and producer-tenants to have more

conversation about the cost of crop inputs as well as reasonable expectations on profit margins," said Melissa O'Rourke, farm management specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach. "ISU Extension has good resources to help people consider how input costs can be considered in setting cash lease rates, and the workshops will show how those can be used."

According to O'Rourke, the volatility of commodity markets has led to increased inquiries regarding both fixed and flexible cash lease methodologies.

Participants will receive a 100-page workbook with resources such as surveys, example lease agreements and termination forms, and a multitude of other publications that will help answer common questions, and possibly spark new ideas.

One of the challenges that Iowa landowners and tenants continue to face is the knowledge gap that can exist with modern production agriculture.

"We have more aging landowners, and landowners who have never farmed themselves – many of these have inherited land from farming parents," O'Rourke said. "Together with the producers, we try to educate the parties to understand factors to be taken into account on setting rent and farmland management consideration."

A listing of ISU Extension and Outreach county offices hosting meetings is available online, with additional information available through the Ag Decision Maker website.

Pre-registration is encouraged, and an additional \$5 fee may be added if registering less than two calendar days before a meeting date.

The Ag Decision Maker leasing section also provides useful materials for negotiating leases, information on various types of leases, lease forms and newly updated Decision Tools.

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

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
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Fun By The Numbers

10 Years Ago This Week - 2009

The Grundy Center Ambulance Department is in the process of becoming a provisional paramedic service instead of offering strictly EMT, service. By having a paramedic onboard the unit, medicine would be able to be distributed immediately to patients in need or during a transfer while in the ambulance

Earlier this spring, Grundy Center City Council approved to expand the ambulance department by offering paramedic services. Ambulance Crew Chief Jeff Latwesen said steps are now being taken to ensure that this moves forward in the fall. Currently, Latwesen said, “We are waiting state approval in order to step up to the next level of becoming a provisional paramedic service.” The city is also reviewing insurance coverage. Equipment including a med kit will also need to be updated in the unit. Once these steps are completed, Latwesen said they would begin the hiring process this fall.

“Ambulance service from the Grundy Center Ambulance Department is required approximately ninety times per quarter and within the last quarter, both Eldora or Waterloo paramedics were called by the Grundy County Memorial Hospital for transfers,” Latwesen said, “I think it will help the city and surrounding areas immensely. Now we are pulling paramedics from Eldora or Waterloo for either hospital transfers or in extreme emergency situations. By having a paramedic on board, time response will be decreased up to thirty minutes in transferring patients to a major trauma center and patients needing cardiac medication or other medication will be able to have it immediately.” Dike, Reinbeck, and Wellsburg also all have part-time volunteer paramedics serving their communities and surrounding areas, Latwesen stated, “The service itself will be self-supporting.” According to Latwesen, a nominal rate increase will be placed on ambulance users due to the added training and equipment for the new service, however, life saving measures added by gaining a paramedic cannot be measured by a dollar amount.

25 Years Ago This Week - 1994

An estimated 35,000 to 40,000 visitors were in Grundy Center last week as the Two-Cylinder Club’s Expo IV turned the east edge of Grundy Center into a vast sea of yellow and John Deere green. A total of 320 exhibitors from all over the United States and Canada brought 627 exhibits to the six-day event. In addition to the Expo exhibitors, there were 81 swap meet vendors.

Grundy County Tourism Coordinator Natalie Appel expressed satisfaction with the organization of local efforts to prepare the community and the county for the Expo.

“We were extremely pleased with the manner in which traffic was handled, and the way the needs of our guests were met. The housing bureau was very successful with placement of visitors into local homes - so much so that many visitors began to make arrangements for next year,” said Appel.

Grundy Center Mayor Troy Anderson expressed gratitude to the city and county law enforcement officials, the many volunteers, and to the Grundy Center Public Works Dept.

“Jim (Copeman) and his staff devoted months of planning and countless hours to the Expo, and their efforts were paramount during the six-day Expo,” said Anderson. Visitors from all over the world visited the area during the Expo. Guests from as far away as the Netherlands, Australia, and Canada visited the site of the Two-Cylinder Club. Many of the United States’ 50 states were represented.

50 Years Ago This Week - 1969

The second major fire in downtown Grundy Center this year caused extensive fire and smoke damage to the Floorcraft building and contents, and minor smoke damage to adjacent building last Thursday night. Loss will amount to about \$15,000.

The fire started about 8:30 p.m. in a rear room on the ground floor of the Floorcraft building, then spread to the unoccupied second floor. Both business and building is owned by John Van Nychaus, of Grundy Center. Spontaneous combustion is tentatively believed to have been the cause of the first. Defense siren had earlier been knocked out of commission by lightning.

75 Years Ago This Week - 1944

The Grundy board of supervisors at a meeting held Monday rejected the three bids submitted to surface 40 miles of secondary roads in the county this year. The bids were rejected because the supervisors thought them too high. They preferred waiting until after the war rather than to pay the price that was asked under the bids.

The bidders included Beu & Sons from Sumner, who have received several similar contracts in this county. Their bid was lowest of the three. It was 41 cents for crushing, screening and loading, 8 cents a yard for hauling and 10 cents a yard for stripping: If this bid were accepted, screening and loading would cost \$40,000. Other miscellaneous costs would bring total cost of surfacing 40 miles of road to \$58,000 or about \$1,500 per mile.

Second low bidder was H.C. Young from Monroe, Iowa. His price was 42 cents a yard for crushing, screening and loading and 8 1/4 cents per yard for hauling. The third bidder was the Modlin Construction Company of Webster City. They bid 42 cents for crushing, screening and loading and 8.3 cents for hauling.




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My Three Cents Worth

Iowa Crop progress and conditions report

DES MOINES – Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Mike Naig today commented on the Iowa Crop Progress and Condition report released by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service. The report is released weekly from April through November.

“After several days of sweltering heat and limited precipitation, the crops got the rain they needed last weekend,” said Secretary Naig. “Farmers are very grateful for the mild temperatures forecasted over the next several days.”

The weekly report is also available on the USDA’s site at nass.usda.gov/ia.

Crop Report

Iowa farmers had 5.0 days suitable for fieldwork during the week ending July 21, 2019, according to the USDA, National Agricultural Statistic Service. There were some reports of crops lying flat and green snap in corn due to high winds produced from various storms throughout the state. Fieldwork activities included spraying and harvesting hay and oats.

Topsoil moisture condition was rated 2 percent very short, 14 percent short, 78 percent adequate and 6 percent surplus. Districts in the southern third of Iowa and the east central district reported topsoil moisture conditions as over 25 percent short to very short. Subsoil moisture condition was rated 1 percent very short, 9 percent short, 81 percent adequate and 9 percent surplus.

Forty-one percent of the corn crop has begun to silk, 12 days behind last year and 1 week behind the 5-year average. One percent of the crop reached the dough stage, 5 days behind last year and average. Corn condition rated 63 percent good to excellent. Forty-seven percent of the soybean crop has started to bloom, 13 days behind last year and 9 days behind average. Four percent of the crop has started setting pods, nearly 2 weeks behind average. Soybean condition rated 64 percent good to excellent.

Seventy-eight percent of oats started coloring, 4 days behind last year and 5 days behind average. Twelve percent of the oat crop has been harvested for grain, 9 days behind last year and average. Oat condition declined slightly from the previous week to 61 percent good to excellent. The second cutting of alfalfa hay reached 56 percent, 11 days behind last year and 8 days behind average. Hay condition rated 61 percent good to excellent. Pasture condition declined for the third straight week with 61 percent good to excellent. High temperatures this past week caused some stress to livestock.

Camden Kickbush named to NABC Honors Court





Local public health, police department team up for bike safety program

GRUNDY CENTER - A new partnership between the Grundy Center Police Dept., Grundy County Public Health Dept. and local businesses will reward area youngsters for practicing safety when riding their bikes this summer.

Starting this week, GCPD School Resource Officer Alissa Loew will be handing out tickets to local kids who are spotted wearing their helmets and practicing safety while biking, skating or scootering around this summer.

The ticket will reward the recipient with a free treat - anything from an ice cream cone at the ice cream shop, to a snack from a local restaurant - gifted by local businesses.

"The goal is to reward kids for practicing safety while they're out this summer," said Katie Thornton-Lang, program coordinator with Grundy County Public Health. "The partnership between Public Health and the police department is a great fit because we both focus on the health and safety of the community - starting with the kiddos."

As a School Resource Officer, Loew has the advantage of already knowing a lot of the local youth through her work at the school.

"They're my kids whether they're in school or not," Loew said. "This is a great way for

me to stay involved with them throughout the summer. I think we're all excited to get this new program kicked off, and I think it'll encourage kids to practice safety when they're out and about."

Local businesses partnering for the program include: Center Theatre, Pizza Hut, Subway, Natural Grind, Headliner, Hair Mechanic, Brothers Market, Sweet Tooth Icy Treats, Manly's Drugstore, Grundy Center Aquatic Concession Stand, and The Landmark Bistro.

This program is just one of many bike safety programs that the Grundy County Public Health Department offers.

Each summer, GCPH hosts a Bike Night to provide local kids and families with information about how to properly adjust and fit a bike helmet, and other bike safety tips. The department also offers free bike helmets to local kids.

During the last school year, the department teamed up with INRCOG to create a Safe Routes to School program, where volunteer adults create a "walking school bus route" to pick local kids up and walk (or bike) with them to school, while talking about how to be safe while walking or biking.





Atypical mistakes

D-NH stumbles defensively, falls to Norse

DIKE – In recent seasons, defense has been a cornerstone of Dike-New Hartford baseball. While D-NH head coach Sean Leonard did not write off Saturday’s district final with Roland-Story as a gimme for the third-ranked Wolverines, he admits he did not foresee defensive issues being D-NH’s downfall.

Alas, the Norsemen collected four unearned runs in the early stages of the district championship in Dike and the Wolverines didn’t get enough hits to drop in response, bringing D-NH’s season to an end in a 7-5 Roland-Story victory.

“We haven’t looked like that defensively all season, and maybe since the beginning of last season,” Leonard said. “It’s a funny game, sometimes. We didn’t make enough plays tonight and that’s a tough pill to swallow.”

The Norse advanced to face either Woodward-Granger or Des Moines Christian in a substate final on Tuesday. The Woodward-Granger/Des Moines Christian game was postponed to Monday night due to inclement weather in the area.

Saturday’s conditions in Dike were hardly ideal, even if the air temperature had cooled from the excessive heat of the days previous. The start to Saturday’s contest was delayed 20 minutes due to storms in the area and a steady rain followed for the first three innings. Once the rain stopped, lightning was spotted in the fourth inning, leading to a further 30-minute delay despite dry conditions.

Once play resumed, the rain returned for an extended period.

In the end, Dike-New Hartford’s season felt washed away in a defensive performance that unfortunately didn’t match the high stakes of Saturday’s contest.

The first inning was an excellent start for the Wolverines, with starter Drew Sonnenberg retiring the Norse in order and Reece Beuter slamming a two-run home run in the bottom half of the inning to score Parker Kiewiet.

Roland-Story answered with two runs in the second inning, including an unearned run after an RBI double drove in Nolan Faber, who reached on a D-NH infield error.

A walk, error, passed ball and wild pitch brought Zach Starbuck all the way around the bases to put D-NH back on top at the end of the second inning.

The third inning was when Roland-Story would take control for good.

Nick Stole doubled to left-center to tie the game and another infield error brought Stole home two batters later. Jayden Macdonald singled home Ajay Twedt and suddenly Roland-Story led 5-3.

More unsteady Roland-Story pitching allowed courtesy runner Gus Varney to score on a wild pitch and Ely Sohn advanced to third before two strikeouts got Roland-Story out of the bottom of the third with a lead.

A leadoff single for Aaron Seydell led to him advancing to second on an errant attempt to pick off Seydell at first.

That error was costly, with

Beuter entered for Sonnenberg at that point, and the Wolverines' ace was solid the rest of the way, striking out eight over four innings of relief.

The D-NH junior and NICL East Most Valuable Player was only available in a relief role as D-NH needed Beuter to stay under 65 pitches to be available for Tuesday's substate final.

Drew's pitched really well for nine weeks and he deserved the right to [start] tonight," Leonard said. "He was more effective than what his numbers show. ... I think his defense let him down behind him. There were plays that needed to be made at certain times and we didn't make them. Reece is the horse here, but we wanted to win three games, not two. If we make those plays, it's a different story."

The Wolverines' final innings were not without hope. Perhaps the best chance was in the fourth inning, loading the bases with two outs for Zak Wauters, who hit a fly ball to left field to end the threat.

Ely Sohn reached on a lead-off single in the fifth, but was picked off by Roland-Story pitcher Zach Twedt.

In the sixth, Kiewiet singled in a run with one out and advanced to third for Beuter.

A big swing and a crack of the bat got D-NH fans out of their seats, but Beuter's fly ball landed in the right-fielder's glove to end the threat in the sixth.

"We had good swings early and even late," Leonard said. "Some at-bats that weren't great but loud outs that happened to be right at people, that's the way it goes sometimes."


to an end.
